The nurse meets Romeo and he tells her that Friar Lawrence has agreed to marry him and Juliet. The nurse returns to Juliet with the message, telling her where and when to meet Romeo.

Friar: I hope that heaven smiles upon your marriage, Romeo, and that you

never have a reason to be sorry for it.

Romeo: Amen to that! Just being with Juliet for a moment would make up

for any sorrows that might come.

Friar: Be warned, Romeo, there is always a price to be paid for happiness.

Look! Here comes Juliet.

Romeo: Ah! Juliet.

Juliet: I love you so much!

Friar: Come with me and we will do this quickly. You shall be married now.

Act 3 Scene 1

The day is hot, and on the streets of Verona the youths are ready for trouble.

Benvolio: Let's go home, Mercutio. It's a hot day and the Capulets are around.

I know if we bump into them there will be a fight.

Mercutio: Don't be such a wimp, Benvolio. You are as keen as anyone for a

good fight.

Benvolio: Here come the Capulets.

Mercutio: Do you think I care?

Tybalt: A word with one of you.

Mercutio: Just one? Why not try two?

Tybalt: Mercutio, you spend a lot of time with Romeo...

Mercutio: Just what are you trying to say? Say it to my sword!

(Mercutio pulls out his sword and puts it to Tybalt's throat.)

Benvolio: Be careful what you say and do – people are watching!

Mercutio: Let them watch! I'll not budge for any man's pleasure.

Tybalt: Well, peace be with you sir. Here comes the person I want to speak

to. Romeo, you are a villain.

Romeo: Tybalt, we share too much now for me to be offended by your

greeting. I am not a villain so leave now. It's obvious you don't know

me at all.

Tybalt: Forget it! I am here to pay you back for the way you insulted me.

Romeo: I've done nothing to insult you, in fact we have good reason now to

be friends. So, please, leave this alone.

Mercutio: What are you letting him get away with insulting you, Romeo?

(Mercutio draws his sword.) Tybalt, you scum! Dare you turn your

back?

Tybalt: Are you looking for a fight?

Mercutio: What do you think, moron?

(Tybalt draws his sword.)

Tybalt: Come on then!

(Tybalt and Mercutio fight.)

Romeo: Mercutio, please stop this. Tybalt, shame on you, stop this outrage.

The Prince has clearly forbidden fighting in the streets.

(Tybalt stabs Mercutio as Romeo tries to stop them. As Mercutio falls, Tybalt and the Capulets leave.)

Planning sheet

Mercutio: I am hurt! A plague on both your houses! I am dying.

Benvolio: Mercutio! How bad is it?

Mercutio: It's but a scratch, but it's enough. Ask me tomorrow and you will

find me in the grave. Romeo, why did you get in my way? I was hurt

under your arm.

Romeo: I thought it was for the best.

Mercutio: Help me into a house, Benvolio, or I shall die here. A plaque on both

your houses! You have made me into worms' meat.

Romeo: My friend is dying because of me. Juliet, you have made me too

weak.

Benvolio: Romeo, Romeo! Brave Mercutio is dead.

Romeo: What a black day this is. It's not going to end here with this death.

Benvolio: Look – it's Tybalt! He's back again.

Romeo: Alive? Victorious? While Mercutio lies dead? Tybalt – either you

or I will be dead in a minute.

Tybalt: You stupid boy – you'll be joining your friend now.

(Romeo and Tybalt fight. Tybalt is killed.)

Benvolio: Romeo – get out of here. The Prince will demand you killed if you

are caught.

Romeo: Fate has been so unkind to me.

(Nurse leaves).

Juliet: O this cruel world! I will go and see Friar Lawrence. If he

can't help me, I can always kill myself.

Act 4 Scene 1

Paris. Here, take this poison. Tomorrow night, take it before you sleep. It will slow down your heart and turn you cold. When Paris comes to wake you he will believe you are dead. Your body will be brought here and laid to rest in the tomb. I will send a message to Romeo in Mantua and he will come to find you. Then you can be

together.

Juliet: Thank you, father. Pray that I have the strength.

Friar L: God be with you child.



Sending a Telegram
